Have you hugged your legislator today? Okay, maybe not a hug, but how about a handshake? Maybe a phone call? Or just letter or fax to let them know you're alive and kicking? ***It's very important stuff!***

Right now between terrorism, state budget crises and war we aren't very high up on the radar right now. We aren't even a smudge on the screen. That could change in an eye blink.

Remember the state bill in Ohio in 1999? If not for some local vigilance in a two month period we could have gone from happy go lucky to snake bit and gone! It's that easy to get legislated out of existence. Especially when the other side has "lawyers, guns & money." Okay, they aren't using guns yet but the other two definitely apply.

You need to maintain a connection with your local, state and federal lawmakers. We're going to need them sooner than you think. Broadband legislation is still waiting on the sidelines. Media consolidation is on the front burner right now at the FCC. We've got a stagnant economy and cable companies who are not afraid to "boo hoo" about how they need the government to make it easier for them to rack up even bigger bucks.

All we have is you, your center and your constituencies. We need you to do the leg work. Send that fax or letter. Make that telephone call or maybe shake that hand.
